- holding transition IEP's for students in Head Start and inviting all pre-kindergarten students to visit the school. Teachers, specialists and a school counselor are available to answers questions and parenting classes are offered by the school counselor. In addition, parenting videos and books are available for checkout from the school library. Communication between educators and parents is vital at Parowan Elementary. We believe that educators and parents need to work together, in order to realize more fully the value and contributions that parental involvement adds to the success of the school. Parents are an important part of their child's education. They are encouraged to participate as full partners and are included in appropriate decision-making committees to assist in the education of their child.
